Jason Winsky: Hello everybody. Actually, the only update I have is we are right in the middle of a CIT class this week. So, I stepped out to join the meeting. We're on a break, which is perfect. And we have 47 students.

I don't know when exactly I'm going to do that, but that's in my future plans, here in the not too distant future. Phyllis Grant: This is Phyllis. The only thing I've been able to do is hand out the flyers that, you know, have the flyers on a table and I table at different events. I am meeting tomorrow with some staff at Casey family. Programs, we're collocated with them now, and so I'm going to take those flyers and see if they know of any families they're working with. You might be interested in joining.

Barbara C: That sounds great Phyllis because I know having people directly involved in the community would be ideal. To have some members that have someone currently in the system, that would be great.

Tyson Gillespie, LAC, BHP: Barbara. We have an active young adult advisory group for one of our clinics. I'll speak to the staff liaison, those are young adults 18 to 24 and see if there's anybody that might want to participate in this community.

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Barbara C: Oh, I would love that Tyson. That would be so swell. My only concern with the college, by the way. I'm just thinking that it was my experience that there was They would learn more from just being here than actually being able to jump in,...

But somebody's reviewing our reports on the QM server So, thank you, thank you. And I definitely want to

Barbara C: Get on there. A couple times a month anyway and just try to pull some and read some just to stay on top of it Phyllis you too.

Phyllis Grant: I'm sorry, wife.

Barbara C: Oh sorry, just a minute.

Barbara C: Oh Phyllis, I was just wondering if On this QM server, if you want to work with me now in the future, and we'll get to looking at some of those reports, or figure out how to make it easier for ourselves, because it was Susan Hyder.

Phyllis Grant: Sure.

Barbara C: That was doing so much work. She was just wonderful, Susan Hyder and...

Phyllis Grant: Yeah.

Barbara C: also. Oh, wasn't she great? And we, we don't have her now and also our Joanne Keel and she's not here today, she's been wonderful about reading. Those reports.

Phyllis Grant: I'll reach out to Fredreaka and get myself back on. I think it was for lack of use. Why I got locked out. I hadn't. I forgot to log on for, I don't know. A couple of months, probably So I just do, I need to reach out to you Fredreaka? Okay.

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Fredreaka Graham: Yes, when you're ready, just let me know because once I send you the link, I think it's like a 30 minute window that you have to access it,...

Phyllis Grant: Yeah.

Fredreaka Graham: So whenever you're ready, just let me know. And then I can set up a calendar invite with you so that your link doesn't expire.

Phyllis Grant: Okay, and I think moving forward, I'm going to carve out some time on my calendar each day to go through the report. So that this doesn't happen again. Because it's easy to forget when I'm doing other things, so okay? Thanks.

Fredreaka Graham: No worries. Thank you.

Barbara C: Perfect Phyllis. That's exactly it. My experience and not to mention understanding how to pull a report, it's still tricky for me but yes, thank you. is, excuse me, on that topic of the QM server Fredreaka is our trainer. Come on, her initials or Who gave us that wonderful training.

Fredreaka Graham: It was CJ a while ago,...

Barbara C: Teaching. Yes.

Fredreaka Graham: Yes,...

Barbara C: Yes she

Fredreaka Graham: CJ is still with AHCCCS but she's in a different department. Now, she doesn't really have any dealings with that part. However, the training itself is on the IOC website. So if you have problems with accessing that or if you have questions you just need to roll through that with you. I'm happy to do it. So just let me know when.

Barbara C: Thanks. Now I did pull down Fredreaka there. There's a PowerPoint presentation. That's what I've been using. So I could get back on, you know, because I didn't have the correct link and that's the one Phyllis. Do you need me to send you a link to that or a copy of that? PowerPoint presentation. It does walk us through nicely and it has some of the important information to use that server, do you need that Phyllis?

Phyllis Grant: Our biggest, I think I still could.

Barbara C: You have. Okay.

Phyllis Grant: I just need to go through my old emails from Susan or and Fredreaka and see who's I don't remember who sent it. So Susan was really good about walking me through How to get into the QM.

Fredreaka Graham: Yes, and I'm happy to do the same.

Phyllis Grant: Me.

Fredreaka Graham: If you guys just let me know what day and time works best for you and I'll carve out some time on my schedule. I'm happy to do that. No problem.

Phyllis Grant: Okay. Thanks.

Barbara C: Thanks Fredreaka and thanks Phyllis very much. Okay, special populations. I'm going to give this to Phyllis and Tyson. I'll let you Tyson do you want to go?

Tyson Gillespie, LAC, BHP: Sure, sure. I'll start with. Our SMI determined members. I think there are several exciting things that I'm involved in, including a collocation project at the CRC with connections.

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Tyson Gillespie, LAC, BHP: The agency that runs the CRC, we have co-located staff doing direct enrollments for members that come in crisis that may be SMI. Determined members, general, mental health substance use or youth and we're able then to you immediately get them onboarded into services and supports.

Tyson Gillespie, LAC, BHP: And then for our transition age youth population, we have some community training. And Phyllis I'll probably be reaching out to see if there's anybody from your staff that may want to come. That's supported through Grant's. One of those is training in the Tip model which is an evidence base model for that population. Another training is staff who are providing direct support and services at a full day, training partnered with the U of A on how to discuss sexual health and STI prevention. So that staff who are directly working with that population. Have some tools when they're having those conversations with staff and then last we are the organization. I'm a part of

Tyson Gillespie, LAC, BHP: And around community partners is continuing to work with department child safety on the rollout of Youth Thrive, which is an evidence-based approach to working with adolescents, young adults, and we'll be providing a training at the end of this summer to community members and also department, child safety staff.

Phyllis Grant: This is Phyllis' Tyson. That is amazing. I am so excited that you guys are co-locating at the CRC. When I was at Hope many years ago, we were co-located for a while. It's such a need and I think your agency you guys are going to do a great job. I am really excited about that.

Tyson Gillespie, LAC, BHP: Actually I'm here today, I had to be out of my office unexpectedly to be over here and actually sitting at the CRC as we speak. So,

Phyllis Grant: Oh, that's awesome. That's awesome. Are you providing peer support? Specialist services? Also? I think.

Tyson Gillespie, LAC, BHP: We act. So we do have some on board with us and then we're also making some referrals to hope for their pack team to be able to support as well.

Phyllis Grant: Oh yeah.

Tyson Gillespie, LAC, BHP: So little in-house, and then for more intensive services, we're referring over to the pack team.

Phyllis Grant: What about family support? Are you guys provided that or is that not something your agency does?

Tyson Gillespie, LAC, BHP: So, as you probably know Phyllis, a little more difficult on the adult side at times,...

Phyllis Grant: Yes.

Tyson Gillespie, LAC, BHP: but for the youth side, I'd definitely be this couple different things we do, but Really want to circle back around with you at some point of how we can maybe make referrals over too thick.

Phyllis Grant: Okay, okay. I'm just really glad to see you guys being at the CRC. I've been working with a lot of people lately and my mental health situation is really bad. So closing any gaps and connecting people to the resources. They need it. To be successful, and further recovery is. Fantastic.

Tyson Gillespie, LAC, BHP: Yeah, it's what we really have seen. We've been doing this for two months and I think the numbers that I saw Yesterday, we've had about a hundred and thirty hundred and forty. Enrollments and...

Phyllis Grant: Wow.

Tyson Gillespie, LAC, BHP: we're only here Monday. We're only here Monday through Friday.

Phyllis Grant: Oh wow, that is great. That is great.

Barbara C: Gosh, that is wonderful. Yes.

Phyllis Grant: so, on my side, I know that some of the struggles we've had in the family and the children's system have been getting services. Especially for those kids who have autism and for their families with the ABA service and things like that. There's been a little bit of movement

Phyllis Grant: In, you know, some of the rural areas are really struggling but the Casa Grande family. I'm working up there. They've seen, they're big. They've really been getting some services they needed and they're getting DDD Altex services which can be challenging to get because of the Lack of providers, but so that's good. I've seen in the county that the children's system still struggles with, getting all the services in place. I know from my own experience what was helpful to my family.

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Phyllis Grant: Are some of those services no longer available or do they look differently. And that's what I'm discovering is that some of those services that we had have morphed into something different and there's been such a high turnover, the last few years and the system has gone through so many changes. People are very confused like right now we have I'm a little confused about Pinal Hispanic Council, Arizona Children's Association, Intermountain. I think that Intermountain has absorb them. And so that has in some cases been created. I have a lot of families who are with Arizona Children's Association, so when Intermountain in the southern region took over Arizona Children's. Some cases went smoothly others.

Phyllis Grant: The case manager they had at Arizona Children's was gone. They did not go with the move and there was no communication about who's going to take over that family's child's case. And it's been, you know, we don't it's like, they'll haven't Costello routine. Who's first to kind of thing is it can be a little confusing and trying to find the right people. I just make calls and see who I can find. Yes.

Tyson Gillespie, LAC, BHP: Hey Phyllis. Hey, Phyllis, we definitely could talk offline. Depending on where in the Southern region, I can definitely get you the points of contact because Pima County looks a little bit different from Pinal than Santa Cruz,...

Phyllis Grant: Yes.

Tyson Gillespie, LAC, BHP: Santa Cruz. And so if you want just reach out, I can definitely get you in touch with the leaders so that you're able to help those families access the care. That they want.

Phyllis Grant: You think that would be helpful, some transitions have gone very well. And very smoothly others. There have been some bumps and some gaps. Nothing. So far it has caused a crisis in the family, which is good news. No one's gone without medication to my knowledge. Anyway, Um, and in the adult system, there's been a little bit of hiccups with, but that has nothing to do with, you know, Intermountain, Arizona Children's. I have a couple of adults who are not being successfully connected with their case manager. The one in particular, and I'm helping that person with that one, we're resolving that situation. The other thing I wanted to bring, thank you Tyson. I will do that. Absolutely.

Phyllis Grant: Yeah. Yeah. And some of them are Banner. I have a lot more banner families I'm working with now than I used to. So yeah, definitely.

Phyllis Grant: The other thing is that going back to the Autism Spectrum, disorder situation or not situation, but Arizona, complete healthy OIFA Department. I'm working on it. They're just starting to talk with us last week at the TA for family and peer support specialists about getting together. A provider of programs for kids identified with autism spectrum disorder and family members, parents, caregivers to meet and have with their calling, a forum to talk about what's available, what the needs are and also to provide support to those family members caregivers as they're dealing with. the community the stigma, especially we talked a lot about the stigma when you're out with a child who has autism if

Phyllis Grant: Does this spectrum is so all encompassing that you have kids, who you wouldn't know have autism except that they have sensory, you know, obvious censorship, or You can't tell it all when you're out in the community with them, they have no signs. You have other kids who are nonverbal, who are easily triggered, more triggered than other kids and who really struggle to be you know, around other people and we're finding education is challenged with You know, handling them without bias and without the stigma, I'm not saying the teachers but they seem to be struggling with other kids. I've had some kids who have been bullied by other kids because they're different. They're just obviously different and so.

Phyllis Grant: So I'm really, I'm hoping that there can be more. We have so many kids who diagnosed with ASD now, and it is more all the time and helping families to connect with resources in the community and and also to feel supported

Phyllis Grant: In the community. So that's really at the very, very beginning. It's just in talks right now about how we're going to do this. And how we're going to connect people with each other and who's going to be at the table. So I kind of wanted to put that out there. I don't think I have anything else with any questions.

Barbara C: Thanks Phyllis. I do have a question for you and Tyson or even even our providers, is there a provider that focuses on this particular aspect? You know that the

Phyllis Grant: There's access for autism which is based in Phoenix, but they now have offices here. I do refer a lot of people to autism speaks and southern Arizona. Autism. I figure what it's called. And also there's some schools that are specific for kids who have autism. The Intermountain has one and there's a new one on Broadway. other than that, I mean there's some, you know, all the providers have I believe staff, who are skilled? And working with kids with autism or will pull in community resources. But there's just, there's just a lot. It's not as many community resources. As there are kids, who need them, if that makes sense.

Barbara C: Yeah, that sounds like a message out there to, you know, increase the support and that arena. Wow. It's interesting.

Phyllis Grant: I think an education because stigma is a huge part of it can affect parents. Often are afraid to take their kids out in the community because they're not, they don't know how they're going to act, and they don't. They don't want me children to have challenges with being out in the community and not all kids with autism do but those who do then they're looked at like it's like you know spank your kid or, you know, control your kid. And the parent doesn't feel like they want to have to go through a dissertation about my child having autism. This is too much noise or something, you know, they shouldn't have to do that. So it's and it's I mean, I would go out in the community with my grandson and if he had a meltdown and he doesn't have autism, it would be embarrassing because people are watching you and looking at you and saying You're a bad parent. I think that's part of the issue. Also for parents is How can I support my child?

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Phyllis Grant: And ignore and let go of everyone that's watching me and making all these assumptions. If I'm at the grocery store if I'm at the mall or try to take them to a movie you know because he's doing so well and now we're going to a movie and yet halfway through the movie, he can't still anymore and is reacting and I've experienced that with my grandson, but not because he has autism because he has other issue had other issues. So I yeah, I think that's part of it, too. Is educating the community about These, it's not a character flaw and it's not bad parenting that kids have autism. Okay, I'm off my soapbox now, sorry.

Barbara C: Oh no, I'm sitting here nodding my head. Yes, yes, yes, experience with you, yes. I have a child that you put me through and it wasn't autism. It's just a child, you know? And then having a proper community and sadly, I have to share my experiences as the communities got a little harder to Please. And Goodness gracious.

Phyllis Grant: He?

Barbara C: Yeah, it's really hard to step out of line these days. It's a little frightening. I'm going by myself. My current experiences have been out in the community, but anyway, thank you. Even as the public health emergency is ending to see the ripple effect in our children, adolescent young adult populations. And not always in.

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Tyson Gillespie, LAC, BHP: Something that could be diagnosed as clinical depression, but, but also socialization problem solving skills that are the social skills solid in school, that that we're seeing in the clinics that I support. And according to the school official that was talking to you there. They're seeing and and their fairly large Tucson district as well. So just put that out there, as community members, who are advocating, we'll see this. For years to come, the young adults and, of course, adults as well were impacted. But just, I guess, as a reminder or as we think about how we can continue to support, These special populations as we move into a new phase outside of the public health emergency.
